TOWN HALL MEETING

New Building Plans

As you may know, First United is collecting information prior to constructing a building addition to the Halifax campus for offices and meetings. Five informational meetings were held with over seventy attendees. The following is a summary of the principal points of the plans.

The proposed MAIN ENTRANCE for weekly business, nightly meetings, and worship will be through the grand lobby connecting the two buildings. Wayfinding and signage will be important as we open the

new building, and over time, we will adjust this to help visitors get to the proper rooms. We expect to gain 25 parking spaces even with the added building.

(You will find the current **BUILDING PLANS** on the church website under the tab "About," then scroll down to "Building our Future Together" for the plans.)

The <u>KITCHEN</u> is proposed to be a catering-style kitchen. This space will be for warming and serving food, with the option for some light preparation. The kitchen will not be designed to prepare meals, nor will there be an oven/range, deep fryer, or a range hood fire suppression system.

The <u>MUSIC</u> area will be located at the rear of the sanctuary. Several rooms will have the walls removed to provide a larger area for music, instrument storage, and gathering.

Storage and accommodation will be added to the multi-purpose room to support YOUTH MINISTRIES. Further, it was suggested that youth would prefer outdoor courts and gaming areas. The landscape plan will include a green area for playing games, a basketball court, and perhaps an area for pickleball, 4 square etc.

Sanctuary modifications include changing the flooring and reducing the overall size. A <u>SOUND ENGINEER</u> will address these changes. We expect other technical improvements to be incorporated during this renovation. The pews will be replaced with beautiful padded chairs that can be moved for different uses of this area.

The building team plans to update this information every quarter..

Lenten Suppers
